Home tasks to support learning:

Science: Animals including Humans

Key vocabulary to know:

Teeth – found in the mouth to rip and grind food

Molars – found at the back of the mouth with flat tops to grind food

Pre-molars – found in front of the molar teeth

Canines – pointed teeth at the front of the mouth to rip food

Incisors – sharp teeth at the front of the mouth to cut food

Mouth – opening in the face to take in food

Stomach – organ for digesting food
Digestive System – a group of organs to
break down food

Producer – a plant that can produce its own food

Consumer – an animal that feeds on plants or other animals

Predator – an animal that preys on other animals

Omnivore – an animal that eats meat and plants

Carnivore – an animal that eats meat only Herbivore - an animal that eats plants only

History – Ancient Egypt

Key vocabulary to know:

Pyramids – tomb for Egyptian Pharaoh's body

Nile – longest river in the world running through Egypt

Mummification – the process of preserving a dead body

Tutankhamun – a young Egyptian Pharaoh

Canopic jars – containers for vital organs needed for the after life Hieroglyphics – Egyptian writing

using pictures and symbols
Pharaoh – an Egyptian King

Afterlife – where Egyptians believed they went once dead

Tomb – the place where a dead body and its possessions were placed

Gods and Goddesses – males and female gods

English:

Read your book at least 3 times a week. Talk about the story, characters, predictions, etc.

Maths:

French:

We are learning to say things that can be found in the classroom – En classe. It would be useful to be able to spell these correctly (note that they don't require capital letters unlike in English): Qu'est-ce qu'il y a dans ta trousse? What do you have in your pencil case? Dans ma trousse j'ai - In my pencil case I have. Dans ma trousse je n'ai pas - In my pencil case I do not have. un cahier - an exercise book. un crayon - a pencil. un stylo - a pen mon my (masculine singular nouns). un taille-crayon - a sharpener ma my (feminine singular nouns). un sac à dos - a rucksack. mes - my (plural nouns) une calculatrice - a calculator et
