This organiser is to help you understand a bit more about what your child will be learning this half term. It would support your child to discuss some of the vocabulary we will be covering and complete some of the home task ideas.

What was his name?• What is this and why was it used?• Name the place where the Stockton and Darlington railway started	<p><u>Home tasks to support learning:</u></p> <p><u>Personal, Social and Emotional Development</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• What is Community? – school/town community – what groups do people in family belong to in the community?• Environment – Recycling/Litter – why not go litter picking? Talk about things they can do to help look after their environment• People who can help me? - recognise professionals / Role Play – Safer strangers – police, nurse, etc.• Money – Discuss how jobs help people to earn money to pay for things – money recognition. Why not try saving for something? <p><u>Computing - Moving a robot</u></p> <p>We will be using the Beebots and learning how to programme simple commands to move the robot.</p> <p>You could practise at home by writing simple instructions (commands) to direct family members from room to room.</p> <p>e.g 3 steps forwards, turn left, 5 steps forwards.</p>	<p><u>Science: Animals including humans</u></p> <table><tr><th colspan="2">Key Vocabulary</th></tr><tr><td>amphibians</td><td>Amphibians live in the water as babies and on land as they grow older. Read it once for decoding. Twice for fluency and third time for expression. In Phonics we will be looking at alternative spellings for graphemes. E.g ai as a,ey, eigh, ea</p>	<p><u>Maths:</u></p> <p>Please learn to count to 100. https://youtu.be/bGetqbgDVaA</p> <p><u>This half term we are:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Counting in 10s, Partitioning 2-digit numbers into tens and units.• Recognise, count, compare and order within 50.• Adding and subtracting one- and two-digit numbers to 20 – recapping bonds to 10.• Double any number up to 10 and half shapes, objects and numbers (up to 10) <p>Please practice any reversals of digits and counting to 50.</p>
